ponent overtook them. The girls came back with the trophy and silver medals.


Meanwhile, the boys team went undefeated until the second day of the tournament reporting four wins and one tie. On the last day, they played against WAB, and even though they had

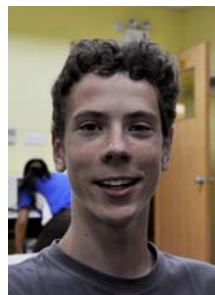
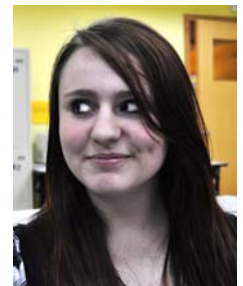

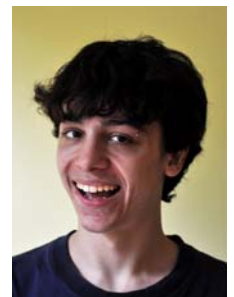
